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SHOW REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE CONDUCT OF EXHIBITIONS AND SHOWS
HELD BY THE HORTICULTURAL DEPARTMENT OF THE
ROYAL JERSEY AGRICULTURAL & HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY
(EXHIBITORS NOT COMPLYING WITH THESE REGULATIONS WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISQUALIFICATION)

1. Exhibitors must be Members of the Society, 10 Years of age or over, except in classes where otherwise defined i.e. open classes or shows.
2. Exhibitors, if they wish to be provided with Schedules and Entry Forms, must specifically ask to be given copies of the same.
3. Amateur – a person who, not being a professional, maintains a garden or grows plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables for pleasure and enjoyment and not for his or her livelihood.
4. All entries should be made on the appropriate entry form.
5. Only one entry may be made in each class unless the Schedule provides otherwise.
6. Exhibitors must forward to the Horticultural Secretary, not later than the date specified in the Schedule, a list of the flowers, fruit or vegetables they intend to exhibit, giving the number of the class or classes in which, they intend to compete.
7. Exhibitor cards with the entry number and class number in which it is competing, will be given to each exhibitor on entering the place of exhibition.
8. Exhibitors are requested to be particular in placing their entry cards, which must be placed by the exhibitor correctly adjacent to their exhibit. The Horticultural Department will not be responsible for any error in placing the cards.
9. Elected Stewards will, if asked, assist exhibitors in the placing of their exhibits.
10. No exhibit, once brought to the place of exhibition, may be removed without the prior permission of the Horticultural Secretary. Exhibits must be staged by the time specified in the Schedule.
11. Exhibitors wishing to send collections to the place of exhibition on the day before the Show must arrange with the Horticultural Secretary, for their receipt and safe keeping. The Horticultural Department, whilst undertaking all reasonable care, does not accept responsibility for loss or damage to any exhibit and does not undertake to stage any exhibit.
12. All plants must have been in the ownership of the exhibitor for at least two months prior to the Show. The Exhibitor must have grown all cut flowers, fruit and vegetables or they will not be eligible to compete for the prize, except where marked otherwise in the Schedule.
13. All plants, cut flowers and vegetables must be distinct and named where possible and in the cases of equality, preference will be given to those exhibits which comply with this regulation. Seedlings and sports must be described as such.

14. Exhibitors are invited to show unusual, new or newly introduced cultivars or plants, whether or not mentioned in the Show Schedule on the Members' Table.
15. The Horticultural Department shall have entire control of all exhibits from the time of their staging at the place of exhibition until the close of the Show.
16. The Committee of the Horticultural Department of the Society elects Judges.
17. Anyone elected as a Judge in a Show will be unable to make entries in that particular Show.
18. The place of exhibition will be closed promptly at 9pm on the day before the Show unless otherwise specified. All exhibitors must have vacated the premises by that time.
19. No person, not being an Official, may remain in the place of exhibition whilst the Judges are officially engaged.
20. The place of exhibition may be opened early in the morning of the day of the Show by arrangement with the Horticultural Secretary.
21. Judging of Fruit, Vegetables and Flowers will be according to the RHS Guidelines.
22. If a given class shall only have one competing entry, it shall not receive a prize or commendation unless, in the opinion of the Judges, it is deserving of one.
23. Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show will only be awarded to exhibits grown by the exhibitor i.e. Fruit, Vegetables, Flowers but not Flower Arranging or Cakes etc.
24. The decision of the Judges as to the merit of an exhibit shall be final. The Horticultural Department reserves the right to remove for further inspection any specimens or plants which are the subject of a dispute. The decision of the Judges shall be final, except in cases when, after an award is made, the exhibit is found not to be in accordance with the Schedule.
25. All matters of protest, disqualification etc **MUST** be lodged with the Horticultural Secretary no later than close of the first day of the Show, when they will be dealt with by an adjudicator appointed by the Horticultural Department whose judgement which shall be based on the RHS criteria and shall be final.
26. All prize money shall be available seven working days after each Show to collect from the Department's offices. **Any prize money not claimed by 31st December shall be forfeited.**

27. DATA PROTECTION

The Royal Jersey Agricultural & Horticultural Society complies with all Data Protection Legislation and any information we hold is not shared with any third parties but your name may be attributed to a photograph in our publications and listed in Show Results. If you wish to see a copy of our Privacy Policy, please contact the Office.

Important Notices for all Exhibitors

- The closing date for entries for the Fruit, Flower & Vegetable Virtual Show will be **MONDAY 28th SEPTEMBER 2020** – entries received after this date cannot be accepted.
- Entries are to be a photograph taken by you of your entry **between now and the closing date** and either emailed to Rachelle Robinson on email rachelle@royaljersey.co.uk or sent by post to Rachelle Robinson, RJA&HS, Royal Jersey Showground, La Route de la Trinité, Trinity JE3 5JP.
- Please advise the class number the photograph is entered into and the date the photo was taken either with the email or on the back of the photograph.
- Photographs may be taken by someone else if you do not own a camera or have a phone with a camera as long as the exhibitor is present and completes the entry form.
- Please include the names of the varieties of flowers, plants, fruit and vegetables where possible.
- For all the Preserve classes, please bring your exhibit to the Horticultural Secretary Rachelle at the Showground Office with your name and class number entered on a label with the exhibit plus your entry form. All Preserve exhibits will be judged at the Showground from 2nd October by the Judge who will be provided with gloves to handle the pots, jars and bottles and a separate spoon or cup for every entry to taste each exhibit which will be thrown away after.
- An entry Form is included at the back of the Schedule.
- Exhibitors may only enter one exhibit in each class.
- All plants must have been in the ownership of the exhibitor for at least two months prior to this Show and exhibitors must have grown all cut flowers, fruit and vegetables for them to be eligible to compete in the Classes.
- Exhibitors must use their own vases, bowls, glasses, saucers, plates, boxes, baskets, palettes and frames.
- One plant per pot unless otherwise stated.
- Exhibitors must be members of the Society, 10 years of age or over in the Pot Plants, Cacti, Succulent, Carnivorous, Cut Flowers, Preserves and the Fruit & Vegetable classes.
- Non-Members may enter the Photographic, Egg, Adult Cake and Adult Floral Arranging Classes.
- Children who are non-members may enter the Children's Floral Art, Children's Cake and Children's Fruit & Vegetable classes.
- There will **only be a winner** in all the classes except the Children's classes which will be placed for all entries received.
- There will be **no prize money** for this Show.
- A judge will be nominated for each of the following sections: Pot Plants (including Cacti, Succulents & Carnivorous), Cut Flowers, Adult & Children's Fruit & Vegetables & Eggs, Preserves and Adult & Children's Floral Art & Cake and the Photographic Class.
- Best in Section Rosettes will be awarded for the Best Pot Plant, Best Cacti, Succulent or Carnivorous, Best Cut Flower, Best Fruit, Best Vegetable, Best Preserve, Best Adult Flower Arrangement, Best Children's Fruit or Vegetable Best Children's Cake and Best Children's Floral Art. The Rosettes and Certificates can be collected from the office once the Results have been issued.
- Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show Rosettes will be awarded to the exhibit in the Pot Plant, Cacti, Succulent & Carnivorous, Cut Flower and Fruit & Vegetables classes with the most points and second most points given by the Pot Plant, Cut Flower and Fruit & Vegetable judges. The Rosettes and Certificates can be collected from the office after the Results have been issued.
- The measuring and weighing of the Longest & Heaviest Fruit & Vegetables will take place at the Showground on either the 3rd or 4th October in the Main Exhibition Hall at set time slots. Once all the entries have been received, the Horticultural Secretary Rachelle will be in touch with each exhibitor to arrange a suitable time for the exhibit to be brought to the Showground to be measured or weighed.
- All winners will be published on the RJA&HS Website and Facebook Pages.
- Well Done Rosettes and a Prize Card will be posted to all entries received from children after the show.

- Ornamental Gourds are excluded from all vegetable sections, including baskets and collections.
- Parsnip measurements are to be taken from where the leaf meets the root, to the very end of the tap root – the root mustn't be trimmed.
