**SHOW REGULATIONS AND IMPORTANT INFORMATION GOVERNING THE
CONDUCT OF EXHIBITIONS AND SHOWS STAGED BY THE HORTICULTURAL DEPARTMENT
OF THE ROYAL JERSEY AGRICULTURAL & HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY
(EXHIBITORS NOT COMPLYING WITH THESE REGULATIONS WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISQUALIFICATION)**

Eligibility of exhibitors

- Exhibitors must be fully paid-up members of the Society, and 10 years of age and over except where otherwise defined or where there are open classes.
- Children must be the age stated at the date of the Show/Exhibition.
- Amateur – a person, not being a professional, who maintains a garden or allotment and grows plants, flowers, fruits and vegetables for pleasure and enjoyment and not for his or her livelihood.
- Professional (Floral Arranging Section) – an exhibitor who is an existing florist or people who earn a living from being a florist, including teaching floristry and people who used to make a living from the profession who are now retired.

Acceptance of entries

- All entries should be made on the appropriate entry form.
- Exhibitors may only enter **ONE** exhibit per class unless stated otherwise in the schedule.
- Exhibitors requesting paper copies of the schedule and entry form may do so by contacting the Horticultural Secretary.
- Exhibitors must forward the completed entry form to the Horticultural Secretary which must be received by no later than **midnight on Thursday 4 June 2026** either hand delivered, by post to Rachelle Robinson, RJA&HS, Royal Jersey Showground, La Route de la Trinité, Trinity, JE3 5JP or email r.robinson@royaljersey.co.uk
- Entries received after this date cannot be accepted - **NO** exceptions shall be given and no alterations accepted.
- Entry forms can be found at the back of the schedule.

Judges and Stewards

- The Committee of the Horticultural Department shall elect the Judges and Stewards.
- Stewards will, if asked assist exhibitors in the placing of their exhibits.
- Stewards will support the Judges to which they are allocated by section ensuring that each exhibit in each class has been judged in that section.
- Any Judge elected for a particular section in a Show will be unable to make entries in that section.
- Should an exhibit of a Judge in another section be awarded Best in Section, they will then forfeit judging Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show.

Exhibits

- Exhibitors must have grown all pot plants, cut flowers, fruits, and vegetables.
- All plants purchased must have been in the ownership of the exhibitor for at least **2 months** prior to the show.
- All plants, cut flowers, fruit and vegetables must be distinct and varieties named where possible – seedlings and sports must be described as such. This makes the show more interesting to visitors.
- All exhibits must be clean and free from disease and pests – any that are not will be removed from the show bench and the exhibitor notified to arrange collection.
- Where pots sizes are stated in the note section for each class – please measure the interior diameter of the rim.
- Pots, saucers, and containers brought to the Exhibition Hall must be clean.
- Additional vases will be available under tables if needed.
- Exhibitors are invited to show unusual, new, or newly introduced cultivars or plants not mentioned in the Show schedule on the 'Members Table'

Staging

- Exhibits may be brought to the exhibition hall on:
 - **Thursday 11 June from 2pm to 6.30pm**
 - **Friday 12 June from 7am to 6.30pm**
- Exhibitor cards with the entry and class number (***in a brown envelope marked with the exhibitor's name***) will be given to each exhibitor on entering the place of exhibition. A Steward/Horticultural Secretary will be available if there are any queries.
- It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to place exhibitor cards correctly and adjacent to their exhibit.
- The Horticultural Committee will not be responsible for any error in the placing of cards prior to judging.
- Show Stewards may direct exhibitors in the placing of exhibits.
- Exhibitors are responsible for making sure that they stage their exhibits according to the schedule and the specific instructions as detailed in the notes for each section e.g. space allocation for exhibit or arrangement, numbers of items in a class, size of pots (internal diameter), number of vases, number of stems per vase, weight, or dimension.
- Exhibits in the Amateur floral arranging adult classes **MUST** be made up in the Exhibition Hall and not at home.
- No exhibit, once brought to the place of exhibition may be removed without prior permission of the Horticultural Secretary prior to 4.30pm on the Sunday.
- Exhibitors wishing to send collections to the place of exhibition on the day before the Show must arrange with the Horticultural Secretary for their receipt and safe keeping.
- Exhibitors are responsible for compliance with the rules governing each class entered.
- The Horticultural Committee shall have entire control of all exhibits from the time of staging until the close of the Show.
- All exhibits **MUST** be staged by **6.45pm** on the evening before the Show unless otherwise specified. All exhibitors **MUST** have vacated the Exhibition Hall by that time.
- No person, other than Society Officials, Judges, Stewards, or Scribes may remain in the place of exhibition whilst judging is in progress.

Judging

- Judging will commence promptly at **7pm** on **Friday 12 June**.
- Judging of the pot plants, cut flowers, fruit and vegetables will be according to the RHS Guidelines where possible.
- The Horticultural Committee reserves the right to remove from the show bench for further inspection any exhibit, which is the subject of a dispute.
- **'Not According to Schedule' (NAS)** - Any exhibit that does not conform to the wording of the schedule or the notes at the top of each section will be given a NAS.
- Judges should write the reason on a Comment Note why the entry is marked as Not According to Schedule.
- If a class has only one entry, it shall not receive a prize or commendation unless, in the opinion of the judges it is deserving of one.
- Prize certificates will be awarded to 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Commended awards.
- Judges may award more than one 1st, 2nd, 3rd or Commended in a class.
- After judging has taken place no exhibit or part on an exhibit may be altered or removed until after **4.30pm** of the last day of the Show, except by permission of the Horticultural Secretary.
- Points are awarded for all Show and Annual Trophies for all classes as follows: 1st = 4 points, 2nd = 2 points and 3rd = 1 point.

Cake Auction

- An auction of all cakes in all classes will take place at **3.30pm** on **Sunday 14 June** and the proceeds donated to Eyecan.
- **If you do not want to auction your cake, please tick the box on the entry form. Any exhibitor who does not want to auction their cake, we ask that they donate an amount to the chosen charity.**
- **We would encourage exhibitors to donate their cakes for auction to help raise much needed funds for the small charities on our Island.**
- If the box is not ticked on the entry form and you do not want to auction your cake, please advise the Horticultural Secretary **by 10.30am on the Sunday**.
- If anyone has any other items for auction, they must be put in the Cake Auction by 3.30pm and the Horticultural Secretary notified.

Prize Giving & Trophies

- **The Prize Giving will take place at 4pm on Saturday 13 June.**
- Trophies to be returned to the RJA&HS Office one week before the Show in the same condition in which they were presented.

Decisions and Protests

- The decision of the Judges as to the merit of each exhibit shall be final.
- All matters of protest, disqualification etc, **MUST** be lodged with the Horticultural Secretary in writing no later than **5pm** of the first day of the Show.
- The Horticultural Chairman will consider the matter/s and make a judgement based on the RHS criteria and their decision shall be final.

Close of Show

- **The Show will close at 5pm on Sunday 14 June and exhibitors are requested to collect their exhibits after the Prize Giving is concluded at 4.30pm and not before.**
- Exhibitors are reminded to empty vases of water and filler as they remove their exhibits.
- Any exhibits not collected by **6pm** on Sunday 14 June will be placed in the Society Office from where it can be collected, unless otherwise arranged with the Horticultural Secretary.

Liability for loss

- The Horticultural Committee will not be liable for compensation for loss or damage to exhibits, personal property etc. All items will be at the risk of the exhibitors.

Ingredients

For the Bronuts

170 g ($\frac{3}{4}$ cup) unsalted butter	100 g ($\frac{1}{2}$ cup) brown sugar
60 g ($\frac{1}{4}$ cup + 1 tbsp) caster sugar	100 g ($\frac{3}{4}$ cup) dark chocolate
2 large eggs	2 tsp vanilla
170 g (1 cup + 3 tbsp) plain (all purpose) flour	30 g ($\frac{1}{4}$ cup) cocoa powder
0.5 tsp salt	

For the Decoration

30 g (2 tbsp + 1 tsp) unsalted butter	100 g ($\frac{1}{2}$ cup) caster sugar
0.25 tsp salt	4 tsp cocoa powder
1 tsp vanilla	2-4 tbsp milk
sprinkles, to decorate (optional)	

Directions

For the Bronuts

Brush the donut pan with some melted butter and set it aside. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F whilst making the brownie mixture.

In the large mixing bowl, melt together the butter, brown sugar, caster sugar and dark chocolate. I do this in the microwave in short bursts, stirring in between, but it can be done on the hob too. Whichever way you choose to do it, make sure to stir often so not to burn your sugars or chocolate. Once everything is melted and well mixed together, leave the mixture to cool.

Once the mixture has cooled down, add the eggs in one at a time mixing in between additions. Add in the vanilla and stir to combine.

Sift the flour, cocoa powder and salt into the mixing bowl and fold in using the spatula until just combined. Spoon the brownie mixture into a piping bag, if using, then pipe into the donut pan. Fill the pan evenly until level with the top. Unlike other baked donuts, these do not rise as much, so there is no risk of it overflowing and the donut hole closing over. Smooth the tops of the mixture once it has all been split between the donut holes.

Bake the bronuts for 10-12 minutes until baked through and the tops have slightly domed and have cracked all the way over the donuts. Leave in the pan to cool for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool before decorating.

For the Decoration

In a small mixing bowl, place the butter, sugar, salt and cocoa powder along with 2 tbsp milk. Heat it in short bursts in the microwave, stirring gently to combine until smooth. Add in the vanilla and mix in well. If you prefer your glaze thinner, add in more milk one teaspoon at a time until it reaches the consistency you like.

Carefully dunk your bronuts into the glaze, gently swirling them around to coat the top of them evenly. Leave to settle back on the cooling rack, popping any air bubbles with a toothpick if needed. Decorate with sprinkles, if desired.

Occupiers** of land bordering on the public roads of the Parish must trim hedges and branches and cut all overhanging trees so as to give a clearance of 12 feet over main roads and by-roads and 8 feet over footpaths and must remove any other encroachments, including all cuttings and trimmings, on the public highway. A financial penalty up to £100 may be levied for each infraction.

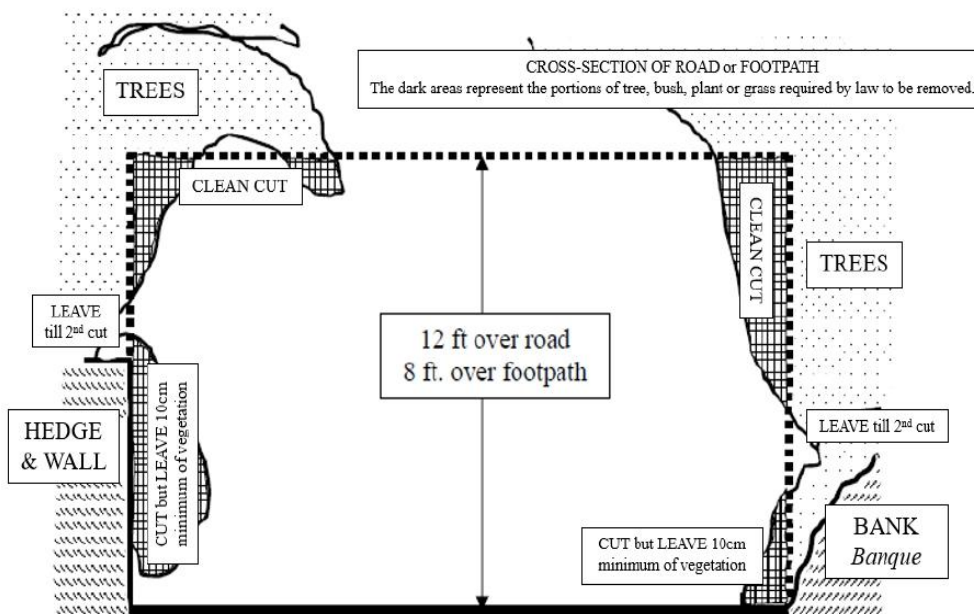

Your Roadside Plants and Hedges, Trees and Banks

a guide to the “branchage law”

<p>What is the law about “branchage”?</p> <p>The Loi (1914) sur la Voirie (“branchage law”) makes roads and footpaths safer for all who use them. It achieves this primarily by requiring that the entire width of roads and footpaths is not restricted by vegetation. ‘Footpaths’ includes pavements and the width of a road includes any “<i>relief</i>”.</p> <p>On two occasions each year, Parish officials carry out the “Visites du Branchage” to ensure vegetation has been cut and removed.</p>	<p>What do I have to do?</p> <p>All occupiers of property bordering public roads and public footpaths in Jersey must –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Trim any vegetation growing on the property so that it does not encroach over the road or footpath. ✓ Ensure a minimum clearance of 12 feet (3.66m) above all public roads and 8 feet (2.44m) above public footpaths and pavements, measured vertically from the point at which the surface of the road or footpath meets the property (see sketch below). ✓ Remove all cuttings. 	
<p>Who is responsible for cutting the branchage?</p> <p>The occupier of buildings or land is responsible for cutting the branchage. For multiple occupancy properties the ‘occupier’ is the company (if the property consists of share transfer flats) or the association of co-owners (if the property is flying freehold).</p>		
<p>What happens if the branchage isn’t removed?</p> <p>There is a financial penalty (up to £100 per infraction), the occupier will be instructed to undertake the work and, if it is still not carried out, the Parish authorities may arrange for it to be done by a contractor at the occupier’s expense.</p>	<p>When are the Visites du Branchage?</p> <p>The “Visites du Branchage” take place during a 3-week period from 24 June and from 1 September. The dates are published in the Jersey Gazette and also on your Parish website.</p>	<p>Does the branchage have to be cut at other times?</p> <p>Irrespective of the Visites du Branchage, it is the duty of the Connétable, at all times, to have all impediment branchage (literally “branches”) and other obstructions or nuisance removed from the public roads, with penalties applicable to those who do not comply.</p>

If you find an injured hedgehog -

- ✓ please pick it up with gloves and put it in a bucket/dustbin/box.
- ✓ phone the Jersey Hedgehog Preservation Group (T: +44 (0) 1534 734340) for immediate help or take it to a vet.

If you disturb a nest with a mother and baby hedgehogs –

- ✓ please cover it over with the material you have cut away and leave the area.
- ✓ if you need to move the family use gloves to pick up mum, then all the babies, place in a bucket/dustbin/box and cover with as much original nest material as you can.
- ✓ phone the Jersey Hedgehog Preservation Group (T: +44 (0) 1534 734340) for immediate help.
- X DO NOT touch the young with bare hands as the mother may reject them.

If you find other injured wildlife or you discover a nest of another wildlife species –

- ✓ please phone the JSPCA (T: +44 (0)1534 724331) or your vet for advice – you should not be charged for wildlife.
